

DISASTER RELIEF

Much of our attention over the last two weeks has been on the devastating flooding wrought by the remnants of Hurricane Helene on September 28. Kingsport, of course, largely escaped unscathed, but just a few miles down the road, we have catastrophic damage to lives and property. The scope of the disaster is mind-boggling, and while we're still trying to figure out what to do about the damage from Helene, it looks like another major hit is coming to Florida in the form of Hurricane Milton.

I'm reminded of the story of a man walking down the beach one morning, noting hundreds of starfish stranded on the beach by the receding tide. If they weren't returned to the water, they would soon die. A little boy was frantically running back and forth, scooping them up, and taking them to the water. The man said to him, "Son, there's so many. You'll never be able to make a difference." The little boy picked up a starfish, threw it in the surf and said, "Made a difference to that one."

With something so big, obviously we can't do everything, but we can do something. We can't minister to every need, but we can minister to some needs. And the needs are going to be with us for some time in the future.

There is a scene toward the end of the *Apollo 13* movie. The crippled spacecraft has limped back to earth, but no one is sure whether it will be able to re-enter the atmosphere without burning up. Someone says in earshot of mission director Gene Krantz, "This is going to be the biggest disaster in NASA history," to which Krantz replies, "On the contrary, sir, I believe this is going to be our finest hour."

This is no doubt the greatest disaster in the Southern Appalachians in memory, if not ever. But this could be the church in this area's finest hour. Southern Baptist Disaster Relief is mobilized and working to meet needs in hard-hit areas. Churches in Jonesborough and other places especially affected by the flooding are coming together, pooling their resources, and serving as conduits for those outside the disaster zone who want to help them to minister to their neighbors. We have the opportunity to bring help and hope to our neighbors just a short distance away who have lost everything.

Thanks to everyone who took part in the Buckets of Hope effort. We took a truckload of goods to be distributed. Thanks also to everyone who gave financially. That money will go to the Sullivan Baptist Association for distribution to various relief efforts.

The needs on the ground are changing, and so our focus must shift as well. For our next project, we are going to concentrate on helping the churches in Jonesborough. Mt. Zion Baptist Church has become a central hub for collecting supplies that are being used by the churches in that area. According to Pastor Cody Greene, current needs are for:

- 1. Hand/feet warmers (HotHands)
- 2. Crowbars
- 3. Shovels
- 4. Sleeping bags and blankets
- 5. Body wipes
- 6. Work gloves and regular gloves
- 7. Diabetic food
- 8. New socks (adults and kids)
- 9. Ensure (nutritional supplements)
- 10. Dry shampoo

11. Gas cards

Any of these items you can supply can be brought to the church on Sunday and we will send them on from there.
